

**FROM OUR PASTOR**



Well it's been a year since we came back into Church. We started with indoor communion and by June we were inside full time again. Most of the congregation that wants to be vaccinated against covid-19 has been by this writing. We have a few who are unable to get vaccinated because of other health concerns. We would like to start getting back to normal within the worship service. I have shared my thoughts with the elders and we have come up with some ideas starting on Memorial Day weekend. Nothing is set in stone and things are still fluid.

What we have come up with so far is having communion as normal. We will go back to using the hymnals. Hymnals aren't used all week and so by the following Sunday, any virus on them from the previous Sunday should be dead. Most members sit in the same place every Sunday so you'll probably just be getting the same hymnal you used last week. We will probably have half of the church pews with no distance between pews and the other half still having every other pew for those who wish to continue social distancing. I'm not sure if we will do left and right side or front and back, but I am leaning front and back for communion flow purposes.

I would encourage everyone to continue using good sanitary practices i.e. washing hands, using hand sanitizer after shaking hands etc.. Do what you have to do to feel safe and comfortable and to make others feel safe and comfortable.

If you want to share your thoughts on any of this please give me a call. Nothing is set in stone and if cases in Missouri and especially in our county start going up we may have to change things again for the sake of those who cannot get a vaccine but would if they could.

Love is the order of the day. We are called to sacrifice ourselves for the sake of others and to think more of others than of ourselves. Paul reminds us, Php 2:3-5 "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. <sup>(4)</sup>Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. <sup>(5)</sup>Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus."

of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night. Joshua 1:8 - This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth; but thou shall meditate therein day and night, that thou may observe to do according to all that is written therein for then thou shall make thy way prosperous, and then thou shall have good success.

We will continue to avoid using the hymnals and social distancing until May 24<sup>th</sup> .

Starting Memorial Day weekend we are tentatively planning to open all but a handful of pews and using the hymnals again. If you wish to continue social distancing, you will be able to do so and the large print bulletins will have the entire service printed but without the melody lines for the hymns and other parts of the service. Communion changes are: no longer spraying rail down between tables with sanitizer and the Elder will be passing out the wine. We will also have a usher to help guide us up to the rail.

***Please remember to sign the fellowship book at the end of the pew if you are taking communion.*** There is one on each end so you don't have to pass to the person on the other end of your pew. This helps us in many ways. Mainly so we can all worship and not worry about who is or isn't present at worship and why. If you are worried about being "tracked", we do not provide your attendance to anyone. It is strictly for statistics and to help the Elders determine if there is an issue that we can help with. # STEWARDSHIP



St. Paul teaches us: “Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches” (Gal. 6:6). And again, he says: “Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel” (1 Cor. 9:13–14). In other words, ministers of the Gospel are supported by the offerings of those who are served by them.

And this is how the church lives even now. It is standard practice. But this deserves closer examination. For it instructs us not just *that* we are to give but also *what* we are to give. And it does so with four little words: “In the same way ...”

St. Paul is building his case for supporting the preachers of the Gospel with the sacrificial giving of individual members on the example of the Old Testament people who supported the Levites with their offerings and sacrifices. We’re to support the Gospel ministry “in the same way.” But how did the Old Testament people support the Levites?

Moses records this: “You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always” (Deut. 14:22–23). The Levites were supported by the tithe, 10 percent of all the yearly yield of that which was harvested.

Does that seem like a lot? Does it surprise you that St. Paul instructs us that we are to support the New Testament Gospel ministry “in the same way?” If it does, ask yourself: Is the church’s job in the New Testament bigger or smaller than the Levites’ job in the Old Testament? Back then, there was one Temple, and the ministry was almost exclusively located in one nation among the descendants of Abraham. In Matthew 28, Jesus calls us to teach and baptize all nations, and there are churches and ministries all around the world! How could we support this new Gospel ministry with anything less than the Israelites supported the Old Testament ministry?

Of course, we are free to give more, for we have received more than those in the Old Testament. We have received the fullness of God’s revelation, the fullness of His salvation, and the fulfillment of everything that God promised to do. For we have received Christ, God’s own Son, in the

flesh, who took upon himself our sins and in exchange gave us his righteousness. The Father claimed us as his own in Holy Baptism. He gathers us together in the place where his name dwells to feast on the first fruits of the resurrection, the risen and living body and blood of His Son – our Lord Jesus. He reminds us that we are His, that all things are ours because we belong to Him. He blesses us here in time with physical and spiritual gifts.

In the same way – and in response to His fatherly divine goodness and mercy – we gladly give to those who proclaim to us “the excellencies of him who called us out of darkness and into his marvelous light.” For once we were not a people, but now we are God’s people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have indeed (1 Peter 2:9–10).

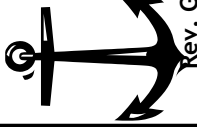
